

Beware of Fraud

Avoid scams and fraud when applying for the Farm and Food Workers Relief Program (FFWR)



There is no need to go to a notary to apply for the USDA Farm and Food Workers Relief (FFWR) program.

- Only organizations awarded the grant by the USDA may process Farm and Food Workers Relief (FFWR) applications.
- Visit www.ams.usda.gov/services/grants/ffwr to view the list of organizations selected to distribute the direct relief payments and find a grantee serving your region.
- Application periods may begin at different times. Relief payments may not be made available at the same time throughout the country.



Application Assistance is Free

There is no need to pay for application assistance. There will be no cost to apply for Farm and Food Workers Relief (FFWR).

Additional Federal Aid and Resources for Farmworkers, Meatpacking Workers, and Grocery Store Workers

Below is a list of resources for health, food, and income support. Some of these resources may be limited to U.S. citizens, “qualified immigrants,” or lawfully present individuals. Eligibility may also depend on the state where you live.

Health

- Health centers – clinics that provide health care to everyone in the community, regardless of insurance status or ability to pay. If you do not have health insurance, the amount you pay for medical care will depend on your income and family size. You will not be turned away if you are unable to pay. Health Centers work at the local level to connect children with oral health and other primary health care services during peak agricultural periods. <https://bphc.hrsa.gov/technical-assistance/clinical-quality-improvement/health-centers-migrant-seasonal-head-start>

Food

- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) – assistance to families to help pay for healthy foods.
- Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) – assistance to families with young children up to age 5 and pregnant women for food, nutrition education, and health care referrals.
- Food banks – a place where you can go to get food free of charge. You can find your local food bank at www.feedingamerica.org.

Income

- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) – monthly cash assistance from the federal government for low-income families.

Safety

- Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) Find general information, employer’s responsibility and worker information including heat illness. Information is provided in English and Spanish. www.osha.gov
